

## REPRESENTATIONS OF THE (EXTRA)TERRITORIAL

### THEORETICAL AND VISUAL PERSPECTIVES

*22-23 April 2016, Utrecht University School of Law*

Progressive, post-realist scholarship engaging with the 'end of geography' has observed that state borders have become porous due to increased communication, travel and migration opportunities, and the emergence of global, cosmopolitan values. Individuals' primary allegiance is no longer, as a matter of course, with the state in which they reside, or with their fellow nationals within that state's borders. Individuals and states may have duties towards 'others' in far-flung places. Borders, in this view, are accidents of history, enclosing an arbitrarily bounded space that is no longer in keeping with the sociological reality of global human interdependency.

The question arises what the evaporation of borders means for conceptualizations of representations of territoriality, sovereignty, and jurisdiction. This innovative conference, organized by Utrecht University in collaboration with the Exterritory art project (<http://exterritory.wordpress.com>), will combine theoretical (academic) and visual (artistic) perspectives. On the basis of an artistic image, speakers are invited to reflect on specific issues of (ex-)territoriality. The conference is interdisciplinary, combining law, political science, philosophy, and art, and will feature leading scholars in the field.

The conference will consist of three panels, addressing respectively conceptual shifts in understandings of territoriality, territoriality and the environment, and human rights territoriality. It will take place in the Spring of 2016, taking two days (afternoon of day 1, and morning of day 2). Speakers are expected to present a paper, which should later be published in an edited volume or special issue of a journal.
